## Workshops for Teaching Faculty – The “iTEACH!” Curriculum

Purpose: To familiarize all teaching faculty at Palmetto Health and the USC SOM with the requirements of GME (residency) education and build capacity for teaching excellence.

### Learning Outcomes

At the end of the activity, participants should be able to:

1. Apply rules of resident supervision to their oversight of resident care in either an inpatient or outpatient setting.
2. Utilize a model for case review to provide formative feedback to trainees.
3. Engage adult learners interactively to optimize learning and retention.
4. Describe the six general competencies areas as applied to the work of residents.
5. Give behaviorally based feedback based on your assessment of trainee competence.
6. Set a goal for personal teaching proficiency development with measures for improvement.

### Target Audience

Faculty members who are associated with Palmetto Health and the University of South Carolina, School of Medicine, Columbia, South Carolina.

### Methods

**iTEACH!** consists of five 90-minute interactive workshops. Each component includes practice exercises and other small group components. The series may be taught as a full-day workshop, but preferably is delivered as discrete sessions separated by a day or more.

Session ONE:	R & R (Rules and Regulations)
Session TWO:	The Doctor is In (Inpatient Teaching and Procedures)
Session THREE:	You're Out (Outpatient Teaching Methods)
Session FOUR:	T.E.A.C.H. (Core skills – goals, feedback, evaluation)
Session FIVE:	Trust (Entrustable professional activities/adult learners)
